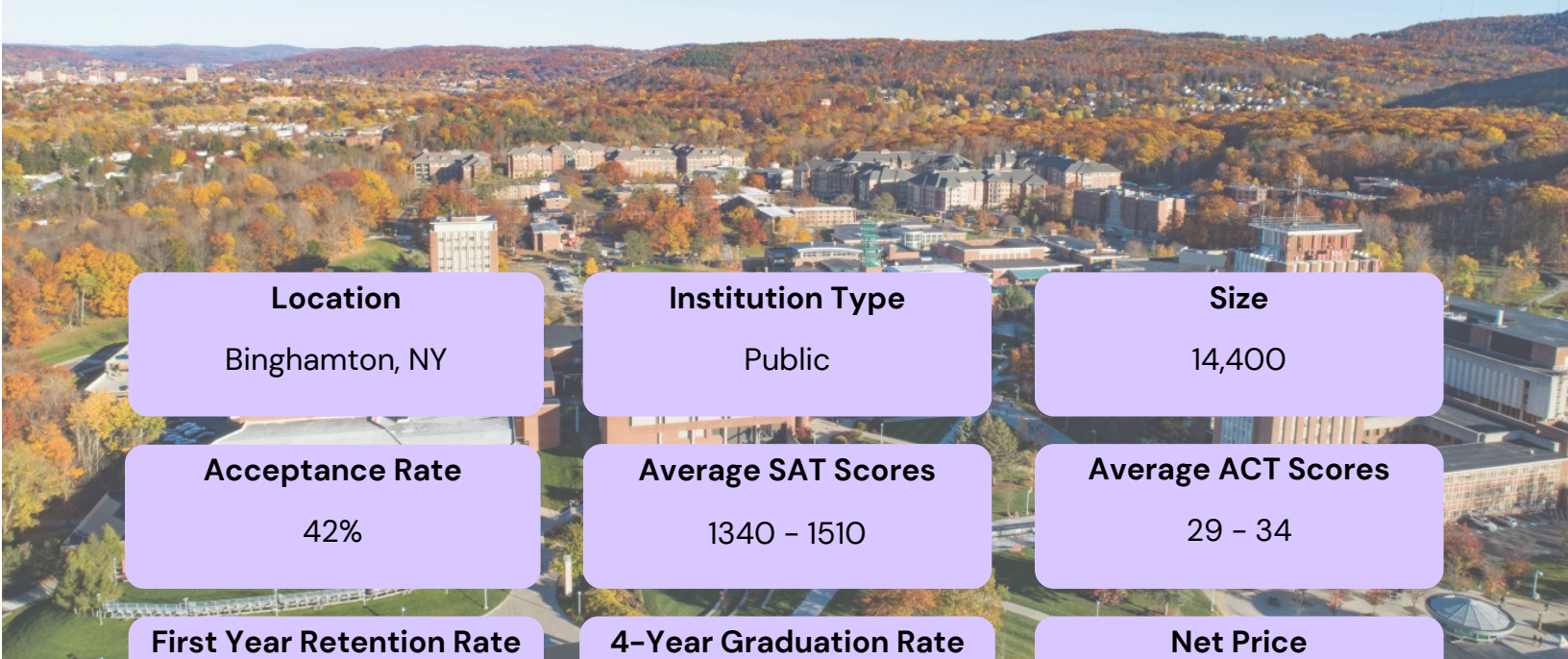

Location & Campus 📍

LOCATION

Binghamton University is in Binghamton, NY, a suburban area with plenty of restaurants, shops, and student hangouts nearby. Downtown Binghamton has a small but active bar scene, with State Street as the main nightlife spot. Outside of that, most of the social life happens on campus.

Life in Binghamton

Binghamton is a suburban area with plenty of restaurants, stores, and big-box retailers that make day-to-day life convenient for students. While Binghamton University is a big part of the community, the town itself isn't a classic college town. Downtown Binghamton has a small but active nightlife scene, with State Street as the go-to place for nightlife. Some students appreciate the quieter setting, while others find the off-campus options limited. As one student put it, "If you're not on State Street or at a house party, there's not much happening."

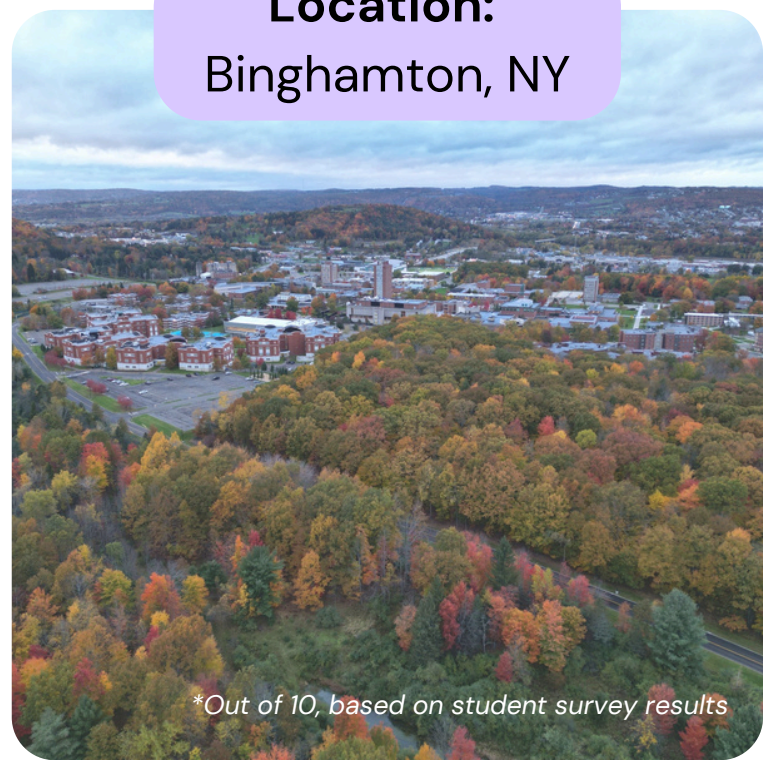
Binghamton experiences over 200 cloudy days a year, making it one of the cloudiest cities in the U.S.

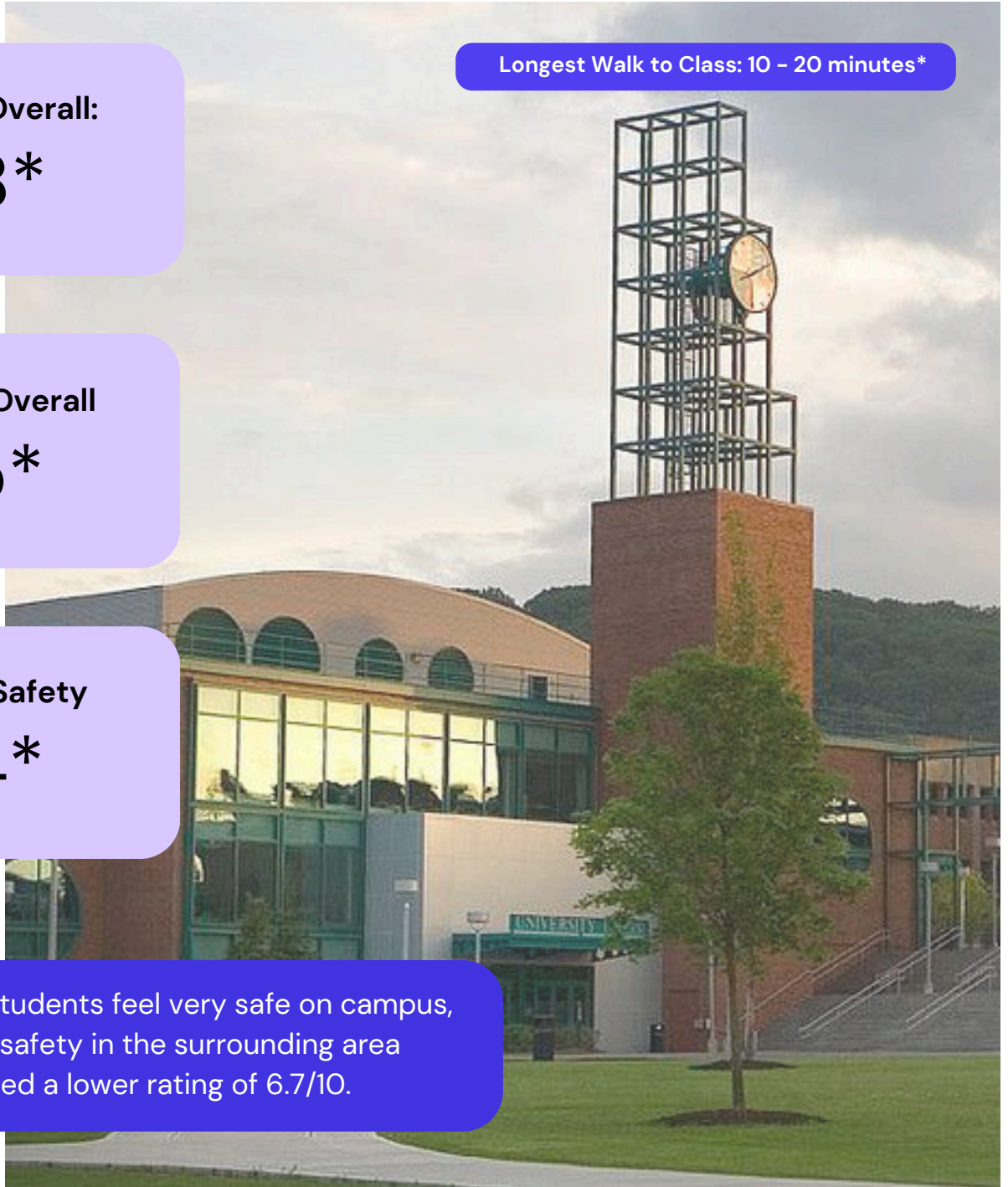

ACADEMIC BUILDINGS

Binghamton's academic facilities are a mix of modern buildings and older lecture halls, with ongoing renovations to improve classrooms, labs, and study spaces. While some facilities, like the Science buildings and School of Management, are well-equipped, others feel dated and in need of upgrades.

Bartle Library

Student Rating: 7.5*

Bartle Library is a top study spot with quiet areas, group rooms, and a central location. Students appreciate the variety of study spaces and research support, but it gets extremely overcrowded during finals. Recent renovations have added modern facilities like a Digital Scholarship Center and MakerLab.

Most students stay on campus for sophomore year before moving off as upperclassmen. Sophomores often move into Hillside or Susquehanna, the on-campus apartment communities. Juniors and seniors typically live off campus in Downtown Binghamton or Vestal, with popular spots like State Street and U Club. Off-campus housing averages \$700-\$1,000* per month.

ON-CAMPUS DINING

Binghamton has multiple dining halls and on-campus restaurants, offering buffet-style meals, grab-and-go options, and meal exchanges at select locations. Students find the food decent but not amazing, with some dining halls better than others.

C4: One of the busiest dining halls, C4 serves Newing and Dickinson with a deli, Kosher Korner, allergen-free meals, and a rotating pizza and pasta menu. It also has Nite Owl for late-night food.

Appalachian: Located in Mountainview, it's the only all-you-can-eat dining hall with a pasta bar, deli, and comfort food, plus Nite Owl for late-night meals.

Hinman: Offers customizable meals like noodle bowls, grain bowls, and fresh-made subs. It also has a Starbucks, convenience store, and Garbanzo, a Mediterranean spot.

CIW: Features a plant-based Mexican station, a comfort food lineup with pasta, quesadillas, and wings, plus Grill 86, a gluten-free grill. It's a quieter spot compared to other dining halls.

💡 Some favorite dining hall meals include: C4's chicken tenders, Kosher Korner mac & cheese, CIW pancakes, grilled cheese, tacos, burgers, and curly fries.

Beyond the dining halls, on-campus restaurants are spread across academic buildings, residence halls, and common areas. The Marketplace in the University Union is a central dining hub with quick-service options and a convenience store. Additional food spots in libraries and dorm communities make it easy to grab coffee, sandwiches, or snacks between class.

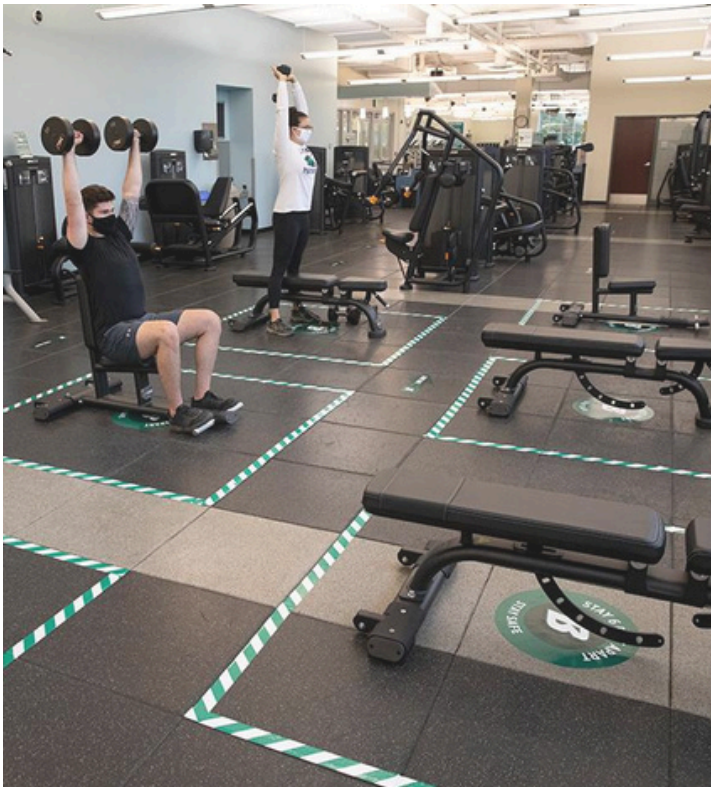

Health Services

Binghamton University's Student Health Services (SHS) is affordable and easy to schedule, with on-campus care for illnesses, injuries, and routine checkups. However, some students report mixed experiences with virtual appointments and doctor quality. While SHS provides basic medical care, vaccines, and lab testing, many cases are referred off campus for specialized treatment.

Student Rating: 5.6*

Binghamton University's University Counseling Center (UCC) offers short-term individual therapy, group counseling, and crisis support. The Let's Talk program provides informal, drop-in sessions at various campus locations. Psychiatric services are available, but students needing long-term care are typically referred off campus. Some students find the services helpful, while others report challenges with appointment availability.

- Most make friends through dorms, Greek life, or clubs, though some say the social scene feels cliquey.
- Without football, athletics aren't a big social focus, but club sports and student orgs offer plenty to do.
- There's a party scene for those who want it, but many focus entirely on academics instead.

GOING OUT

Binghamton isn't a huge party school, and many students prioritize academics over nightlife. That said for people who do want to go out, there's always something to do whether it be a dorm party, frat party, or hitting the bars downtown.

 **OCCT (Off Campus College Transport)** is a student-run transit services that offers free rides from campus to downtown (and back) on weekend nights




- **Greek Life:** Even though only 15% of students are in Greek life, many say it's a dominant force on campus, especially in the social scene. Binghamton has ~40 fraternities and sororities. While it's an easy way to meet people, some students feel it can be exclusive. For those not in Greek life, 450+ clubs, intramurals, and campus events offer plenty of other ways to socialize.
- **Party Scene:** Binghamton has an active but not overwhelming party culture, with most big parties happening off campus at frat houses or student apartments. Spring Fling, SantaCon, and Halloweekend are some of the biggest party weekends of the year. On campus, dorm parties and small gatherings are popular, but stay smaller due to RAs.
- **Bar Scene:** State Street is the center of Binghamton nightlife, with a few popular bars that students frequent. The scene is small and can feel repetitive, but it's still the go-to for students looking to go out. Thursday through Saturday are the busiest nights, and free late-night buses make it easy to get downtown.



"The Rat" (Rathskeller Pub)

Short for The Rathskeller Pub, The Rat is one of Binghamton's most well-known college bars, located on State Street. It's a popular spot for cheap drinks, loud music, and a packed dance floor on weekends. Students either love it for its rowdy energy or avoid it for the same reason. Its reputation has made "The Ratz" a nickname for the entire State Street bar scene.

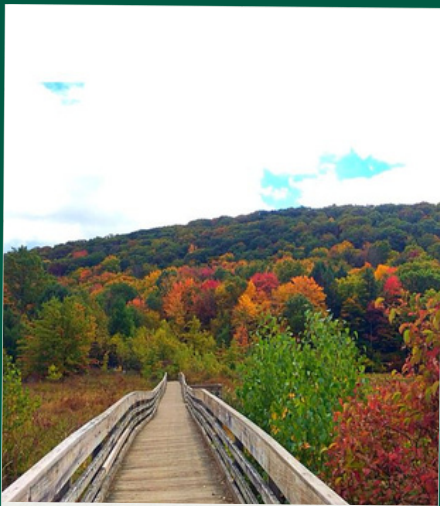
