Miami University is a mid-sized public university in Oxford, OH, known for its strong academics, lively social scene, and classic college-town setting. 

CAMPUS & FACILITIES

Farmer School of Business: The center of Miami's business programs, featuring modern classrooms, and plenty of study spaces for group work and networking.

Data Science Building: A high-tech hub for analytics and Al, with cutting-edge labs, flexible classrooms, and hands-on learning spaces for data-driven fields.

Pearson Hall: The main science building with modern labs, lecture halls, and research facilities, making it a go-to for biology and chemistry students.



The Worst X

Laws Hall: A large lecture hall building with minimal standout features. Mostly used for intro-level courses, but not known for study spaces or amenities.

Hughes Hall: A science and research building with older labs and classrooms. Functional, but not as modern as other STEM facilities on campus.

McGuffey Hall: A historic academic building primarily used for education courses. While it has character, it lacks modern updates found in newer buildings.

EKing Library

Student Rating: 7.3*

King Library is a top study spot with plenty of seating, group rooms, and quiet areas. Students appreciate the friendly staff and central location, but say it gets overcrowded, especially during exams. Many feel it could use renovations, to improve natural light and add more individual study rooms.



Most Miami freshmen and sophomores live in dorms, which vary in quality and location. Some are close to classes, while others require a longer walk. By junior year, most move off campus, renting apartments or houses nearby, often within walking distance of Uptown.

Most students stay on campus for their sophomore year before moving off as upperclassmen. Sophomores often live in Sorority Quad or in on campus apartments at Hawks Landing or Heritage Village. Juniors and seniors move to off campus houses or apartments in Uptown with the best locations on Church, Vine, or High Street. Off campus housing averages \$1,000-\$1,300* per month.







ON-CAMPUS DINING

Miami has multiple dining halls and on-campus restaurants, though students say food quality and variety could improve. Some prefer eating off-campus, but on campus options include:

Maple Street Commons: A popular dining hall with multiple stations like a pasta bar, stir-fry, and comfort food. Its convenient location near Uptown makes it a go-to for students between classes.

Garden Commons: The only all-you-can-eat dining hall, offering unlimited portions and rotating themed meals. it's a top pick for students looking to get the most for their meal swipe

Western Dining Commons: Features international cuisine, plant-based meals, and a sushi bar.
Students like it for its healthier options and diverse food choices.

Martin Dining Hall: A homestyle dining option with a focus on rotating comfort food and classic meals.

It's a solid choice for students looking for filling, traditional dishes.

Beyond the dining halls, Miami offers several on-campus spots for quick meals and snacks. Armstrong is the busiest, with fast-casual options and a market. 

Health Services

Miami University's Student Health Services (SHS) is easy to schedule with, and many students appreciate the friendly staff. However, there are concerns about the quality of care, with several students reporting misdiagnoses and a lack of medications. Some felt the services were limited and not very thorough, leading them to seek off-campus healthcare. While SHS is accessible, there's room for improvement in both care quality and availability.

Student Rating: 6.7*

Miami University's Student Counseling Service (SCS) offers individual and group therapy, crisis support, and psychiatric services. Students receive three free individual counseling sessions per year, with additional sessions available for a fee. The Campus Care program provides free, drop-in sessions twice a week for quick support. While some students find these services helpful, others report challenges with scheduling, and several noted that expanded mental health support is needed.

SOCIAL LIFE

- Some students mention a sense of entitlement and a cliquey vibe on campus.


GOING OUT

Miami's going-out scene is lively and centers around Greek life. The focus is mainly on bars and parties, since there's not much else to do in Oxford. Students note balancing academics and social life can be tough, with such an active social scene.



- **Greek Life:** Greek life is central at Miami, influencing social events, networking, and the party scene. While it offers an easy way to make friends, some students feel it can be exclusive if not involved. However, clubs, intramurals, and campus events provide other social opportunities.
- Party Scene: Miami has an active party culture, with frat and house parties dominating
 underclassman nightlife. Freshmen and sophomores often attend Greek events and offcampus parties. By junior year, students move to Uptown bars, though major weekends still
 feature house parties. Halloween & Green Beer Day are some of the biggest party events.
- Bar Scene: Uptown Oxford is the nightlife hub, with Brick Street, CJ's, and Chanks being
 popular spots. Miami is unique in having several 18+ bars, making nightlife accessible to
 younger students. Thursdays are known for bar rentals, where student organizations take over
 venues for themed parties.





A classic freshman night out includes pregaming in the dorms, heading to a frat or Chanks, then ending the night at Brick Street. Late-night Bagel & Deli is a must.

SCHOOL SPIRIT

Athletics

At Miami, athletics aren't a major focus of campus life. Some students skip sports events, and tailgates aren't a big draw for most. For those who do attend, sports offer a chance to socialize rather than show strong school spirit. While the teams have had some success, sports play a smaller role in student life overall.

Campus Events

Miami's tight-knit, social campus makes it easy to feel connected. Campus events, clubs, and Greek life create a strong sense of community.

- Mega Fair A key event for Miami students, Mega Fair is a huge campus organization fair where students can explore clubs, sports, and extracurriculars.
- Green Beer Day A popular tradition at Miami, this annual event marks the start of spring break with green beer, bar hopping, and a campus-wide celebration.
- Battle of the Bricks One of Miami's biggest sports rivalries.
 This annual hockey game against Ohio University draws packed crowds to Goggin Ice Center to cheer on the RedHawks.






